PARENTS ARE MISSING OUT ON FREE MONEY

 \$3,200 for your child's future education is available with no personal contributions required

WHO CAN GET IT?

- Every child, 6-8 years old in BC is eligible to receive the new \$1,200 BC Training and Education Savings Grant
- · Every child whose parents have ever received the National Child Benefit
- Supplement (family income below \$44.701) is eligible to receive \$500 from the Canada Learning Bond on application and \$100 per qualifying year until 15 years of age
- This is truly free money to start your child's education fund. Only 27% of eligible Chilliwack families have applied for their Canada Learning Bond!

WHY SHOULD I GET IT?

- Children with some savings are 50% more likely to attend post-secondary education
- Children with savings, from low-income families are 4X more likely to graduate from post-secondary education

B.C. parents missing out on hundreds of thousands of dollars in free money

The Push-Back (ugh...)

- "These grants aren't free"
- "Many parents can't afford this"
- "Don't you have to contribute \$2,500 to get the free grant?"
- "My accountant told me the grants aren't free and that I shouldn't sign up for this"
- "I'm finding this to be very inappropriate"

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What's Causing the Confusion

- Lack of clear information to parents
- High skepticism (Free money? Yeah right.)
- Special government accounts are needed to collect
 "I don't have one of those, <u>can't afford one</u> oh well"
- Costs nothing to open:
 - Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP)
 - Also Registered Disability Savings Plans (RDSP)!
- Parents still unaware that no contributions are required

The Cost of Grant Collection

Yes, it's really \$0

- Empty RESP and RDSP accounts can be opened at no charge with 50+ institutions
- Contributions are <u>never required</u>
 - Voluntary deposits receive various matching but not necessary
 - *Some carriers require contributions* find one that doesn't
- Parents/guardians can open an empty account for free, then apply for Government grants at no cost

Disability Savings Matching

- Contribution match rate is "crazy good"!
- Open empty RDSP
 - No contributions necessary
 - \$1,000/year bond for 20 years (*annual net income under <u>\$32k</u>)
- *If* you do contribute... (*and net annual income under <u>\$98k</u>)
 - $\$500/year (\$42/mo) \rightarrow$ government **quadruples** to \$2,000 (\$168/mo)
 - Next \$1,000 (\$83/mo) → government triples to \$3,000 (\$250/mo)
 - This can turn \$1,500yr (\$125/mo) of savings in to \$5,000/yr (\$417/mo)
 - That's an instant gain on savings of **+233%**
 - National enrolment is <u>under 30%</u>

RE: POLICY 620: SIGNING AUTHORITIES


RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Board of Education approve Policy 620 – Signing Authorities and abandon <u>Board Regulation</u> 802.2 <u>Authorized Signatures.</u>

BACKGROUND:

A further review of remaining policies and Board Regulations considered for 600 series has taken place. It has been recommended that Board Regulation 802.2 – Signing Authorities be established as a Board Policy and that the language be reviewed.

The language in the attached draft Policy 620 – Signing Authorities has been reviewed by our policy consultant, with staff and by legal.





POLICY 620 SIGNING AUTHORITIES

The Board designates the Superintendent of Schools ("Superintendent") as its Chief Executive Officer and delegates to the Superintendent, the authority to establish the district's signing authorities in consultation with the Secretary Treasurer

Other than specific signing authorities articulated within this policy, the Secretary Treasurer is authorized to manage appropriate signing authorities for all departments and schools and establish clear administrative procedures regarding same.

District Corporate Seal

Authority to affix the District Corporate Seal is restricted to the Superintendent and the Secretary Treasurer for use on corporate documentation including budgets, exempt staff contracts and property documents.

Signing Officers

The signing officers for execution of all documents requiring the district corporate seal shall be the Chair of the Board, or in the absence of the Chair, the Vice Chair; the Secretary Treasurer, or in the absence of the Secretary Treasurer, the Assistant Secretary Treasurer; and the Superintendent.

Documents Requiring an Officer of the Board

For contracts and other legal documents requiring an officer of the Board, the signing officers shall be any two of the following: the Superintendent of Schools, the Secretary Treasurer or the Assistant Secretary Treasurer.

Electronic Signatures

The signatures on system produced cheques shall carry the electronic signatures of the Secretary Treasurer and a designated manager within the finance department.

The signature on system-produced purchase orders shall carry the electronic signature of the Secretary Treasurer.

Superintendent of Schools Secretary-Treasurer or, *in the absence of the Secretary-Treasurer*, Director of Finance and Board co-signers as required


